The theme of the 13th Fumigants & Pheromones Conference is *25 Years of Sharing Through Education*. This conference will feature new and practical applications of pest management with two hands-on workshops. Each speaker has been carefully selected to offer an international perspective on how we protect our food, grain, structures, wood, and fiber from invasive pests.

Throughout the past 25 years, this biennial conference has followed the guiding principal of “Sharing Through Education.” The 2018 version will be no different.

Since our first international conference in Lübeck, Germany in 1993 and the many domestic continued education conferences, thousands have attended, from over 60 countries. Stored product protection is a unique niche discipline. We are using fewer toxic and environmentally impactful products and methods in order to be more proactive and less reactive to out-of-control pest issues. Twenty-five years ago, the thought of pheromones and non-pesticide applications was in its infancy. Today, the rush to develop and utilize proactive approaches is a sign that our industry has listened to our customers to offer them options. Options that include insect growth regulators, genetic selection, resistance detection and management, fumigant scrubbers, mating disruption, pre-emptive application of low impact pesticides, scanners, cell phone applications for recording, and advanced communicating. Yet pesticide resistance, replacement of methyl bromide, new invasive pest insects, and deadly strains of food borne bacteria are appearing and commanding our attention with new research, new jobs, and the need for continued training.

The keynote speaker is Dr. Steve Yaninek, former Department Head and current professor at the

College of Agriculture, Department of Entomology, Purdue University in West Lafayette, Indiana. It is an honor to have Dr. Yaninek discuss his career. He has worked tirelessly to reduce hunger throughout the world and enthusiastically guiding a major entomology department to protect pre-harvest and post-harvest issues. Dr. Yaninek has many stories to tell about **pest management around the world**. His friendly and caring style of speaking is enjoyable and energetic.

Special Conference Dinner
